PRAYER NEWS FROM WORLD VISION

World Vision

July is normally a time when school children in the UK celebrate all their hard-won academic achievements: Exams completed; celebrations from end-of-term discos to the formality of Prom; Graduation, all moving on and up. This year, the extraordinary events caused by the coronavirus have put a stop to the celebrations. Not just in the UK but globally, education has been interrupted.

The interruption of education brings about all kinds of additional problems. For the poorest families in the UK lack of technology, lack of access to free school meals and abuse in the home all put children at risk. And in countries where World Vision works, school closures increase other serious risks and fears for vulnerable children too. When school and livelihoods disappear, children's futures are threatened by unimaginable choices and horrors – including malnutrition, starvation, child trafficking, labour and marriage too.

For many children in Bangladesh and other countries where poverty makes life fragile, school is more than just a place to learn. School is also where children often get their only proper meal of the day. And it's also a place where child protection programs exist, helping to warn and stop exploitation and abuse of children. When children are missing from school it can often serve as a warning for something serious, alerting community systems to prevent child trafficking, abuse, or child marriage.

While coronavirus has closed schools in Bangladesh, World Vision continues to work and stay connected with vulnerable children and their families. By distributing books and materials, children like 9-year-old Mahfuza, in grade three of her local primary school, can continue her education.

However, as daily labourers the coronavirus has left parents like Mahfuza's without any way of supporting their families. No income, means no money to buy food, leaving children at risk from malnutrition or even child marriage.

As in the UK, family and neighbours are doing what they can to support each other. But families like Mahfuza's are even more thankful for World Vision's cash & vouchers program enabling them to buy the basics and for care packs that are helping their children to survive and thrive. Families are praying the situation will soon change in Bangladesh but meanwhile life remains desperately precarious for Mahfuza and her friends.

So, please continue to pray. Because together, our prayers are empowering the most vulnerable children in the most dangerous places to overcome poverty and experience fullness of life. So, in your families and churches please pray with us to help end violence against children, protecting them today and empowering them for tomorrow.
